About the College: Few Words



"Atmagyandipobava" - Be your Own Light of Knowledge

Krishnagar Women's College, founded in 1958, owes its inception to the influx of women from erstwhile East Pakistan who were in need of education after India wins back its freedom. The urge felt by the educated circle of Krishnagar led to the establishment of this one and only College for women in the disrict that initially started its academic journey in Krishnagar Government College and then shifted to an old building located in Basanta Chatterjee Lane. Soon, the construction of the present College building started with the financial assistance from West Bengal Government under the able leadership of its first founder Principal, Professor Dipti Bose. Since then the College is marching forward with the sole intention to impart quality education to a cross-section of women most of whom are first-generation learners and hail from the marginalized section of society. The College was first affiliated to Calcutta University and it came under the aegis of Kalyani University in 2000. The College has been accredited by NAAC first with a grade of B++ and with a B+ in its second cycle.

The Institution has a number of infrastructural facilities to offer to the students an ecofriendly beautiful green campus of 3.9 acre in the heart of the city, dedicated teachers, 24×7 CCTV surveillance, a well-stocked automated Library with e-journals and OPAC facility, well equipped Science Laboratories, Classes with ICT tools, Computer Laboratory, Free Wi-Fi, Cheap Canteen, providing hygienic food, safe and pure drinking water, cycle stand, toilet for differently abled persons, clean Hostel for students, expansive playground and attractive sports facilities and a medicinal plant garden.

The Institution offers Honours Courses in ten subjects at undergraduate level in the faculty of Science (Chemistry, Mathematics, Geography, and Economics), Literature (Bengali, English and Sanskrit) and Humanities & Social Sciences (History, Political Science and Philosophy) respectively. It emphasizes on regular class teaching complemented with special lectures by eminent faculty members and inter-departmental lectures throughout the year. The students can access a number of e-joiunals for academic purpose under the guidance of their teachers. Additionally, A variety of add-on certificate courses, Study tours, Seminars and workshops are offered to the students to add extra edge to their domain of knowledge. The College has signed MoU with few neighbouring Colleges and Kanyashree University and is engaged in various collaborative projects.

As an outcome of the discipline and regular theoretical and practical classes, class tests, the students do fairly well in University examinations, sometimes scoring highest marks in some subjects.

The college Library has more than 27,000 books. Students can also access 6293 e-Journals and 195809 e-Books under N-LIST programme of UGC-INFLIBNET. Library is fully automated by Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS) "KOHA".

To encourage students from the marginalized sections of society, various scholarships like Kanyashree, Aikyashree, Swami Vivekanada Merit cum Means and others, have been floated by the State Government and the students get all the supportive help from the dedicated staff while applying for the scholarships and Students Credit Card through online portal.

The College has a vibrant career counseling and placement cell to empower students in their journey towards career growth. The cell arranges various training programmes, mostly free of cost, to enhance communicative skill and ICT skill of the students. We also offer few regular courses for skill enhancement and capacity building of our students. Currently, we are running an app based certificate course on communicative English offered by British Council Library. This year we have planned to introduce a certificate course on Computer offered by WEBEL. The College also maintains an online job portal to prepare students for competitive examinations. From this year we will also offer short term vocational training to our students.

Hostel ia an integral part of the college. Students coming from distant parts of the district as well as from outside the district can find accommodation in the College Hostel located inside the campus at a cheap rate .It is completely safe and secure with three full time Hostel employees and other staff to take care of the boarders.

The College is committed to imparting a holistic development of the students by encouraging them to take part in various co-curricular and extension activities and their achievements in this field are recognized in the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony. A variety of programmes organized by the Cultural and Magazine Sub-Committee, like observation of days of National and International importance are a regular feature of the institution. Publication of departmental wall magazines and College magazine helps the students to see their own writings in print for the first time.

College believes that physical exercises, recreational activities and sports are an integral part of education. Annual sports of the college are conducted regularly. Additionally, we have planned to offer short term courses on Yoga and for self defense from this session.

We also take care of mental and physical health of our students. They can avail free of cost treatment and medicine from Students Health Home centre near our College. We also arrange health check up camps in the campus on regular basis.

NSS unit of the College monitors our environment-friendly campus and provides students with the ambience necessary at a centre for teaching and learning. The NSS Volunteers are actively engaged in outreach programmes viz. adopting slum area, conducting survey in the surrounding villages, organizing seminars, distributing essentials among the children of the adopted village and organizing a health-check up camp for them.

Ragging is strictly prohibited in the College and the hostel. Besides, College has set an Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) and Grievance Redressal Cell care where students may lodge complaint if they have any and it is addressed with extreme care.

The College has the legacy of having eminent academicians and renowned personalities at its helm to frame policy for overall academic and infrastructural development of the College. At present the College is run by a Governing Body headed by an acclaimed academician, Sri Siddhartha Majumdar, Chairperson, West Bengal School Service Commission and Associate Professor, City College, Kolkata. The Principal, Dr. Natasa Dasgupta, a renowned academician and an accomplished social personality, is empowered to implement the decisions taken by the Governing Body. Apart from the Governing Body, IQAC plays an important role in working closely with the faculties to create an effective teaching-learning environment with a view to reach the goal of the institution.

Office of the Krishnagar Women's College is equipped with the "College Automation System (C.A.S 7.1 Version)" and is aimed to provide easy, automated and hassle free services to its students with several wings of the office.

Krishnagar Women's College, once established to cater to the need of the post -partition displaced girls is now serving as a multifaceted centre for empowerment of girls. Projects like installation of solar panel, Water ATM under Sajal Dhara Prakalpo, Rain water harvesting system and introduction of two new courses are in the pipeline. Challenges are many and in spite of that, we envisage to take this only Women's College in the district to a new era of emancipation, academic and creative excellence.

General Information For Admission to Honours & Programme Degree Course of Study


Reservation Of Seats: 22% seats shall be reserved for candidates belonging to the Scheduled Castes and 6% seats shall be reserved for candidates belonging to the Scheduled Tribes and a relaxation of qualifying marks to the extent of 25% from the marks secured by the last candidate admitted in general category would be permitted. For OBC category, 17% seats will be reserved in which OBC-A (10%) and OBC-B (7%) seats, will be reserved &increase of seats is achieved within a maximum period of six years beginning with the academic session 2014-15 and then shall continue in the same manner. In case of OBC-A & OBC-B the candidates getting admission should have obtained in the previous examination, qualifying marks not lower by more than 10% from the marks obtained by the last candidate of the General category (W.B. State Higher Education Institute(Reservation in admission)Act-2013),(W.B. Act X of 2013) Dated. January 03, 2014. In any case, if a candidate obtained marks lower than the minimum qualifying marks prescribed by the University in clause-3 of admission rule for admission to relevant courses, he/she will not be eligible for admission. In case ST candidates are not available, those seats will be offered to SC candidates and vice-versa. When both SC and ST candidates are not available, seats may be converted to general category with the permission of the competent authority.SC and ST candidates admitted with the general candidates in order of merit, however, will not get the benefit of reservation. The candidates should furnish caste certificate issued by the competent authority (Sub-Divisional Officer of the Sub-Division and others as declared by the competent authority) along with application without which such application will not be entertained for consideration.

5% of the total number of seats in each subject shall be reserved for physically challenged candidates. Such candidates should furnish copy of valid disability certificate, issued by the competent authority (The Handicap Board constituted by the Office of the Superintendent, District Hospital) of the district of residence, along with

application without which such application will not be entertained for consideration. The percentage of disability of the candidates will only be considered while preparing the merit list of such physically disabled candidates.

Regular Facilities

❖ Library: The College boasts of a well stocked library, fully equipped with booksto cater to the needs of the students as per the new Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) Syllabus. The College has also installed Library automation software and in the coming days aspires to have a fully automated and digitally accessible library. The registration for N-List enables the faculty and students to have an easy access to e-books, e-journals and other electronic reading materials.



❖ Classrooms: The College boasts of well aired classrooms both in its main and apex buildings, always making the teaching learning process a favorable experience.


Co – Curricular and extracurricular activities :

"Ragging" means causing, inducing, compelling and/or forcing a Student, whether by way of a practical joke or otherwise, to do any act which detracts from human dignity, or violates her person, or to expose her to ridicule, or to forebear from doing any lawful act, by intimidating, wrongfully restraining, wrongfully confining, or injuring her, or by using criminal force upon her, or by holding out to her any threat of such intimidation, wrongful restraint, wrongful confinement, injury, or the use of criminal force.

SUPREME COURT VERDICT FOR STRINGENT ACTION IN CASE OF RAGGING:

The Honourable Supreme Court of India in its recent direction to the educational institutions pronounced that all educational institutions should obtain an UNDERTAKING from each candidate at the time of admission to the effect that, he/she is aware of the system of punishment in case of ragging to other students. And that, in case he/she is involved in any case of ragging, he / she is aware of the scale of punishments, including criminal action, cancellation of admission, expulsion from hostel, withdrawal of scholarship, imposition of fine uptoRs. 25,000/-, and / or rigorous

imprisonment up to 3 (three) years, etc. All candidates and their parents / guardians, in their own interest, are advised to make themselves acquainted with the relevant rules, regulations, provisions of law, as well as decisions of various Courts of Law, including those of the Apex Court, in relation to anti-ragging measures in India.

Code of Conduct for Students

Krishnagar Women's College, being the only College for women in the district, maintains a well-drafted code of conduct that aims to set parameters for academic excellence and fulfilling the stated mission and vision of the institution. Onceadmitted; the students are to follow the rules and regulations of the institution in order to maintain academic discipline inside the campus as well as outside the campus. - *Admitted students must abide by the University directive regarding attendance (more than 75%) in classes, failing which they will not be allowed to sit for Semester-end Examination.

- *Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited in the College campus as well as in the Hostel. Anti-ragging Guidelines issued by UGC are enforced and it is mandatory that students sign and submit the Anti-Ragging Declaration Form at the beginning of the session. They can report any incident of ragging to the Anti-Ragging Cell of the College.
- *Students are not allowed to adopt any unfair means at the time of examination.
- * Students are not allowed to loiter in the corridors.
- * Use of Cell phones during class lectures and in the examination hall is strictly prohibited.

- *Students are expected to follow the College Notice Board as well as the College Website for notices and other academic information.
- *Students should stay away from any act of violence that may disrupt the conducive atmosphere of the College. They should take note that the College campus including the Hostel area is under CCTV surveillance.
- *Use of caste and religion-based discriminatory and derogatory remarks is an act of humiliation and indignity and it is strictly discouraged.
- * Participation in the various cultural and extension activities organized by the College is mandatory for the students.
- *It is expected of students that they should maintain a friendly relationship with their fellow students and behave respectfully with the Principal, teachers, librarians and non-teaching employees of the College.

Re-Enrolment in I to VI Semester Classes

If a student completes regular course of study for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Semester I to VI Honours & Programme/General examination, but for any reason fails to enroll himself/herself for the Semester I to VI examination, he/she shall be required to reenroll himself/herself in the said semester class respectively in the following session within 07 days from the last date of admission for regular students of that class. However, the permissible chance of such reenrollment shall be guided by clause 4.2 of the 'Examination regulation of the University. The college authorities must get such students enrolled for examination within two weeks of their re-enrolment in class.

Provisional Enrolment in II to VI Semester Classes

Candidates appearing at the end Semester examinations shall be enrolled provisionally for the next semester classes respectively within 07 days from the date of completion of the said examination, failing which such candidates shall not be enrolled on any subsequent dates and they shall be deemed to have discontinued study.

Admission on Transfer

If a student has been admitted to a college, he/she shall not, except as otherwise provided in the Ordinances, be subsequently admitted to any other college without the production of a Transfer Certificate from the Principal of the college in which he/she studied last.

A student admitted to a college, shall not ordinarily be allowed to take transfer to any other college, except at the end of a semester. If an application for transfer is made at any time, other than at the end of an academic year, on the ground of (a) transfer of the parent or guardian of the student from the station at which the college is situated, or (b) reasoned need for a change on the ground of health supported by proper medical evidence, or any other sufficient reason, the Principal may grant the transfer.


Admission on Transfer should abide by the following stipulations:

- (i) A candidate taking transfer from one college to another is required to pursue the same course of study with identical subject combination in both the colleges;
- (ii) Admission on transfer must not violate the approved intake of the course concerned of the college granting admission. Only in cases of wards of Government employees who have been transferred, a relaxation of intake may be granted with the permission of the Vice-Chancellor;
- (iii) Cases of admission on transfer must be intimated in writing to the University authority by the college admitting such candidates within a fortnight of such admission without which such admission on transfer will not be recognized;

All other steps and procedures related to transfer will be in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinances.
